Dance Theater Workshop continues its new WorldWideWorks series with Lucy Guerin Company from Australia. Tickets are \$27, \$17 for DTW Members, DTW Performing Arts Card holders, students and seniors, with ID. WorldWideWorks, a new series presented by DTW's Inter/National program, is DTW's window on world artists. From Europe and Asia, this season's companies represent a wide range of current activities in the international arts scene and DTW's commitment to introducing important artists from around the world to audiences in New York.

Lucy Guerin Company, performing in New York again after three years will present two works, *The Ends of Things* and *Melt. The Ends of Things* is based around a central character (played by **Trevor Patrick**) whose life, as he understands it, is drawing to a close. His world is reduced to a small room from which he continues his mundane daily activities with painstaking, fastidious monotony as he remembers in fragments the life behind him. These scenes of regret and missed opportunities are represented by three dancers, **Brett Daffy**, **Stephanie Lake** and **Ros Warby**, who eventually encroach upon his world, collapsing the boundaries between reason and chaos and consigning him to the borderless expanse of the stage and beyond. With an original score by **Franc Tetaz**, lighting by **Margie Medlin** and set/costumes by **Dorotka Sapinska**, *The Ends of Things* "presents a poignant yet up-beat reflection on the final days of things, lives, eras" (Hillary Crampton, *The Age*, Melbourne).

Also on the program is Guerin's newest work, *Melt. Melt* describes a rise in temperature from freezing to boiling with each degree explored physically and temperamentally. It is an intensely focused and dynamic duet for Ros Warby and Stephanie Lake, whose detailed gestures and movements are further animated by precision motion graphics. The relationship between them is mercurial – sometimes in tune, sometimes conflicted. Progression and change are the essential themes of this work, and the transformations that inevitably occur through exposure to external forces.

Lucy Guerin was born in Adelaide, Australia and graduated from the Centre for the Performing Arts in 1982 before joining the companies of Russell Dumas (Dance Exchange) and Nanette Hassall (Danceworks). She moved to New York in

1989, where she spent seven years, dancing with Tere O'Connor, Bebe Miller and Sara Rudner. Now based in Melbourne, Australia, Guerin has been commissioned to create work for Mikhail Baryshnikov's White Oak Dance Project, Chunky Move, One Extra Dance Company, Dance Works, Tasdance, Ros Warby and Woo Co. (Denmark). Guerin premiered *The Ends of Things* in the 2000 Melbourne Festival, winning three Green Room Awards. She also received the 2000 Sidney Myer Performing Arts Award for achievement by an individual. Other awards include the Prix d'auteur from the Rencontres Choregraphiques Internationales de Bagnolet in France and a 1994 New York Foundation for the Arts Choreographic Fellowship. In 1997, she received a Bessie Award for her work *Two Lies*. Her work has toured to New York, Portland, Stockholm, Noisiel (France), Rotterdam, London, Copenhagen, Glasgow, Potsdam (Germany), Ludwigsburg (Germany), Sydney and Adelaide.
