THE state government has responded to claims of possible compensation for marine park sanctuary zones in native title areas, saying rights and interests of indigenous Australians will be taken into account when

developing the zones.

Environment and
Conservation Minister Paul Caica said providing traditional use of resources to indigenous Australians such as traditional fishing within marine parks will be recognised. "In developing a draft marine

park management plan, Aboriginal heritage and the interests of the traditional owners of any land or other natural resources should be consid-ered," Mr Caica said.

"In relation to a draft marine park management plan, the government must seek the views of a representative of all signatories to any Indigenous Land Use Agreement (ILUA) that is in force in any area with

in a marine park.
"The government must also seek the views of a representa-tive of any native title holders or claimants that have a native title determination or regis-tered native title claim."

Mr Caica said any prohibi-

tions or restrictions applying within a marine park are sub-ject to native title and native title rights and interests.

He also said one member of the marine parks council of South Australia must be knowledgeable of the marine environment in relation to indigenous culture.

There are six native title claims waiting to be determined that interact with proposed marine park sanctuary zones in South Australian waters
